The Second Foreign Language Proficiency Test-Basic (SFLPT-Basic) The 2018 Test Report

The Second Foreign Language Proficiency Test-Basic (SFLPT-Basic) was developed in line with the Ministry of Education's policies on the teaching and learning of second foreign languages (Japanese, French, German, and Spanish) in senior high schools and with the goal of meeting the assessment needs of Taiwan's foreign language learners at the beginner level. The test consists of three sections: Listening, Vocabulary & Usage, and Reading. Scores on each section range from 0 to 40, and the maximum total score is 120.

I. Examinee Background




Figure 1. Examinee distribution by language

In 2018, nearly half of all examinees took the Japanese test, and more than a quarter took the Spanish test (see Figure 1). The average age of examinees was 18.2 years, with the youngest being 12 years of age and the oldest being 76 years of age. About 97% of these examinees were between 15 and 24 years old.




Figure 2. Examinee distribution by education level

In terms of education level, general senior high school students or graduates comprised 48% of the examinees for all tests, and vocational senior high school students or graduates accounted for 18% of the total. In addition, 27% were university students or graduates. Among those taking the Japanese test, the two largest groups of examinees were made up of general senior high school students or graduates (37%) and vocational senior high school students or graduates (35%). As for those taking the French, German, or Spanish test, general senior high school students or graduates made up the majority (see Figure 2).




Figure 3. Examinee distribution by length of foreign language study




Figure 4. Examinee distribution by test-taking purpose

More than 80% of examinees for all tests had been learning the language on which they were tested for two years or less (see Figure 3). Almost 60% of all examinees took the test because they wanted to assess their learning achievement or because the SFLPT was one of the assessment criteria used by their schools (see Figure 4).

II. Score summary




Figure 5. Average score by test section

The average score is correlated with the length of time that examinees spent studying the language. Generally speaking, examinees earned lower scores on Vocabulary & Usage (see Figure 5).




Figure 6. Examinee distribution by achieved level

In terms of examinee performance, 75% of examinees achieved CEFR A1 level or above (a total score of 60 or higher with each section score above 13; see Figure 6), while 15% achieved CEFR A2 level (a total score of 96 or higher; see Figure 6).




Figure 7. Examinee distribution of AP Program by achieved level

The pass rate of examinees from the "Senior High School Advanced Placement (AP) Program" was substantially higher than that of the other examinees, with 84% achieving the A1 level or above, including 26% who achieved the A2 level (see Figure 7).

Average scores by education level

Except for those who took the Japanese test, university students or graduates performed the best (see Table 1).

Average scores by length of study

Those who had learned French or German for one to two years earned noticeably higher average scores on all sections than those whose length of study was less than one year (see Table 2).
